#### **Summer Worship Series**

Worship on Sunday, July 9

"Sacred Lament"

Scripture: Psalm 42

Like our psalm last Sunday, Psalm 42 is a psalm of lament. It is rich with the psalmist's tears and trust. To lament is not just to cry, but to cry out—to direct your sadness, grief, confusion, and pain somewhere other than yourself. In scripture, we are taught to lament to God. Despite much of American Christianity's emphasis on happiness and positivity as the ultimate sign of faithfulness, scripture teaches us that lament is a faithful act.

Our Jewish neighbors know this well and it is witnessed clearly in their rituals of mourning. The fundamental message of Judaism about death and bereavement is that we are not alone in our grief and their traditions and practices reflect this understanding. Through *tahara* (ritual cleansing of the body), the *shomer* (one who guards the body until the funeral), sitting *shiva*, and the meal of condolence the community carries grief together. Even in this time of lament, the *Kaddish* is prayed. Far from denying their sadness, mourning is embraced. And in the midst of the mourning the Kaddish recited at graveside. The Mourner's Kaddish is commonly used, (find a Mourner's Kaddish lesson and translations here). It is a prayer that praises God in the midst of (not in denial of) sorrow.

Likewise, every biblical lament ends in a declaration of trust, that God is still good, that God is still present, that God is still the rock upon which we stand, even if we can't feel it. Even if life isn't good, God is still good.

Lament does not try to answer the question of why we are hurting. It is not satisfied with pat answers like "it's all in God's will" or "it's for a greater purpose."

Lament does not talk about God. Lament talks to God.


#### In Sympathy
