Embodied Love

Our Stewardship series is based on the Gospel of Matthew Lectionary passages for October. One very important theme in Matthew is the Kingdom of God. The Kin(g)dom of God is radically different than the realm that the early church was living in.

In God's kin-dom, there is abundance: more than enough food, money, love, and resources for every child of God to thrive. When there's enough for everyone, no one needs to fight or oppress anyone else. Everything Jesus taught and did was about breaking down hurtful, oppressive systems and building up God's kingdom of abundance instead.

So, when some religious leaders Jesus, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?", it didn't take a second for Jesus to respond, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." And "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

How does one love God? Why is it so hard to love our neighbors? For that matter, why is it so hard to love oneself? This Sunday we will consider these questions and ponder how Jesus and the saints through the ages embodied this commandment.

This song has biblical origins. "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. People do not light a lamp and put it under the bushel basket; rather, they put it on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. — Matthew 5:14-16 — New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition — "No one after lighting a lamp puts it in a cellar, but on the lampstand so that those who enter may see the light" — Luke 11:33 (NRSV)

The author of the song is unknown, but it is thought to have originated in the 1920s and was first published in *Action Songs for Boys and Girls (1944)*. Since then, it's been sung by untold numbers of children in Sunday school and at church camp and holds a place in the history of American folk and gospel music. In the 1960s, the song became an anthem of the civil rights movement, inspiring marchers while standing up to their oppressors.

Whenever it's sung, it's a call to action. As Christians we cannot passively respond to God's grace, we must act, using all the talents God has given us. Whether we are young, old or in the middle, we all have gifts and abilities that can be used to show God's love for everyone in the world.

Our talents are a precious gift given to us by God. Be like Jesus and be a good steward of your talents; working to spread God's love.
